## Tribute to a Landmark

Most Atherton residents are familiar with the grand old oak located on Stockbridge Avenue at Ralston. It is with deep regret that the Town had to take the tree down because of old age, decline and extensive white rot. Despite adverse growing conditions, the tree matured to a massive size, with a 17-foot circumference, a magnificent architecture, and a 90-foot canopy spread. The Live Oak has had a long history with the Town and will be missed by many residents walking and driving under its majestic canopy.

Standing under this tree, it is not hard to imagine native American Indians enjoying the shade and acorns on their migrations to coastal areas. This was certainly one of the oldest oaks in Town. We appreciate the heroic efforts of residents Susy and Larry Calof to preserve the tree and for the 25 years of loving care they gave to the oak. The Calofs are also contributing to the replacement cost for a new tree. TruGreen Tree Care will be donating time and labor to plant the new tree. Any neighborhood residents wishing to make a donation toward the purchase of a specimen tree to replace the oak should contact Kathy Hughes Anderson, Town Arborist, at 752-0526. This elder Live Oak has been enjoyed by many generations and we will honor it by planting a new tree as a living heritage to be enjoyed by many future generations of Athertonians.

## New Mayor and Vice Mayor

The City Council meeting of December 18, 2002 was a memorable occasion for the Town. Three Council Members were sworn into office, each for a four-year term. Alan Carlson and Bill Conwell were sworn in as reappointees on the Council, and Charles Marsala was newly sworn into his Council seat. The three were appointed to office in accordance with State law, since three candidates were competing for three seats and the City Council subsequently chose to cancel the regularly scheduled November 2002 municipal election.

After the oaths of office were administered, the City Council unanimously chose Council Member Jim Janz to serve as Mayor and Council Member Kathy McKeithen to serve as Vice Mayor. Annually, the Council appoints two of its members to serve in these important roles. Congratulations Mayor Janz and Vice Mayor McKeithen!

Also during the December City Council meeting, outgoing 12-year veteran on the City Council Dianne M. "Didi" Fisher was honored for her years of service with many accolades and heartfelt tributes by several civic dignitaries and Atherton residents. She received proclamations from the House of Representatives, State Assembly and the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors.

## Street Projects Coming Your Way

The Public Works staff is busy putting together plans and specifications for rebuilding and resurfacing streets this coming Spring and Summer. Streets that are scheduled to be rebuilt include San Benito, Bassett Lane, Lane Place, Atherton Avenue between Linda Vista and Stern, James Avenue between Magnolia and Lilac, Lilac Drive and cul-de-sac, Lowery Drive, and the two Atherton Avenue cul-de-sacs on the north side of Atherton Avenue. Stockbridge from Alameda de las Pulgas to Selby Lane will be patched and overlaid, and the Holbrook-Palmer Park parking lots will be patched and resealed. The Town also has a consultant working on plans to replace Elena Avenue's crossing of the Atherton Channel.

## First rains of the season hit Town with a bang

**A large tropical storm hit the Peninsula on November 7 and 8, 2002 bringing winds as high as 50 miles per hour and nearly three inches of rain.**

Most of the Town lost power for over 12 hours and some homes were without power for several days. At Town Hall, the Police and 911 systems remained powered up due to Town Hall's emergency generator system. Throughout the Town, dozens of trees came down, blocking driveways, streets, and damaging some structures. A packed house at the Planning Commission meeting finished up under emergency lighting. Public Works personnel worked through the night and into the weekend clearing the damage.

For most, this was a reminder to keep your flashlights filled with fresh batteries as well as lanterns handy to help deal with a small scale power outage. The Town offers sandbags to its residents free of charge at the Corporation Yard at 99 Dinkelspiel Station Lane (adjacent to the Town Permit Center). Residents need to fill their own sandbags.

Remember that if you must travel during a storm, please observe Public Works vehicles with their trademark rotating amber lights. This could be a sign of a downed tree or flooding, but usually at the least marks a worker out of their vehicle. Please drive safely while near Town workers cleaning up storm damage and restoring road access.



Identity thieves steal your identifying information, such as name, address, date of birth, social security number, and mother's maiden name, with the intent to impersonate you. This information enables the identity thief to commit numerous forms of fraud which include, but are not limited to, taking over the victim's financial accounts, opening new bank accounts, purchasing automobiles, applying for loans, credit cards and social security benefits, renting apartments, and establishing services with utility and phone companies. In the computer age, it is just as important to protect your identifying information as it is to protect your home and personal valuables. Some basic tips include: do not throw away receipts, pick up your mail everyday, do not leave personal information in your vehicle, and be careful of who you are giving your information to over the phone or the internet. **For more information on how to prevent identify theft, the Atherton Police Department has a brochure available to all residents. ## Beware of Foreign Fraud Scams

The Atherton Police Department warns residents against fraud scams originating in foreign countries. Do not become a victim of these international criminals!

Please do not fall for false claims out of Spain that you are a winner of a lottery in a foreign country. Unless you know that you entered one, the claim is false! Another scam originating out of Nigeria is that someone else has won, but they will share a portion of the winnings with you, if you only let them use your bank account.

Most of these scams involve contacting the victims either by fax or e-mail. The scenarios can be different, but almost all request to have access to your bank account, usually under the premise of depositing money in your account.

Never give out your personal identity or financial information over the internet or the telephone to someone you don't know!

The criminals in these countries know that they are immune from prosecution. Even if authorities in the United States were able to identify who these suspects are, there is no way to extradite them here or prosecute them in their own countries.

Be aware and protect yourself against identity theft. It is the fastest growing crime problem in our country.

## Child Abductions: Protect Your Children

A Report from the  
Atherton Police Department

The horrific and frightening cases we have all heard about recently, such as Elizabeth Smart, Danielle van Dam, and Samantha Runnion, have caused a great amount of fear in our community and across the nation. Parents are scared and frustrated. How do we protect our children?

Here is some good news: child abductions by strangers are actually on the decline. The statistics show that nationwide, about 100 children will be kidnapped and murdered, held for ransom, or taken with the intent to keep by strangers this year. That number is down from the 200 to 300 in the 1980s.

The bad news is one child abducted is one too many and we want to do all we can to prevent such an occurrence.

What has increased is the media attention and the rise of missing person and missing children groups that focus on this issue. Cable news channels have based programming for entire shows on these cases. And the fear surrounding the issue of stranger, non-family abductions is rising, not the number of such crimes. The stranger abduction is a very rare and frightening occurrence, which is exactly why they are so newsworthy. Statistically, your child is in greater danger of being abducted by your spouse than by a stranger.

Far more likely to harm your children is the man who lives down the street, or the youth coach, or your brother-in-law. In other words, someone you know. They probably would not abduct your child, but harm them through sexual abuse. Someone known to and trusted by the victim usually commits child sexual abuse. And that person is also known and trusted by their parents.

Do we end up worrying so much about the stranger abduction that we don't take proper precautions to prevent our children from being victimized in other ways?

Take proper precautions to prevent your child from being kidnapped! But, don't forget that your child is far more likely to be victimized by someone you know. And you probably would not find out or be able to do anything about it until years later, since many of these crimes go undisclosed.

Also, the internet is becoming one of the most dangerous places for kids to be hanging out. We will address that problem in a forthcoming issue. Don't forget to take precautions to make sure your child is not left unsupervised with someone who will take advantage of their trust.

So here are some prevention tips on stranger abduction:

"Stay away from strangers," is a popular warning to children. Unfortunately, however, many children are abducted or exploited by people who have some type of familiarity with them but who may or may not be known to the child's parents.

The term "stranger" suggests a concept that children do not understand and is one that ignores what we do know about the people who commit crimes against children. It misleads children into believing that they should only be aware of individuals who have an unusual or slovenly appearance. Instead, it is more appropriate to teach children to be on the lookout for certain types of situations or actions rather than certain kinds of people.

Grown-ups should NOT ask kids to do things that other adults should do for them – like ask for directions, or help them find a lost puppy or kitten. Adults should be asking adults to help them with these problems. Children should yell, "NO," or say, "Wait right here," and then go get their parent or teacher.

Children should never be asked to touch anyone or themselves in areas of the body covered by their swimsuit or allow anyone else to touch them there.

Children should learn to stay away from individuals in cars or vans. If a person in a vehicle follows a child, they should seek help immediately and report the incident.

They should know its okay to say NO – even to an adult. Parents should explain that their children's personal safety is much more important than being polite.

And children should be reassured that there is always someone who cares about them and will help them.

Children need to ask their parents' permission or grown-up in charge before:

- Going anywhere with anybody
- Leaving the yard, play area, or going to someone's home
- Catching a ride home with someone
- Getting into a car or leaving with anyone – even if its someone you know
- Taking any presents like candy, ice cream, or money
- Giving out their name, address or telephone

If a child is at home they should never open the door to a stranger. If a stranger comes to the door, the child should get the parent or grown-up in charge before opening the door.

If a child is in a public place and someone tries to take them, they should try to get away from him or her – scream and yell! Teach your children to yell, "Someone is trying to take me! This man is not my father!" Teach them the "Velcro" technique – find another adult, preferably a woman, and attach themselves like Velcro to their leg. It is never too late to get help. The child needs to keep asking until they get the help they need. Many people care about them. Someone will listen and believe them.


